A BILL

To reduce child poverty in the United States, and for other purposes.

1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-

2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

4 This Act may be cited as the "Child Poverty Reduc-5 tion Act of 2023".

6 SEC. 2. CHILD POVERTY GOAL AND ACCOUNTABILITY.

7 Title IV of the Social Security Act (42 U.S.C. 6018 et seq.) is amended by inserting after part B the following:

PART C—CHILD POVERTY ACCOUNTABILITY MEASURE "SEC. 441. NATIONAL GOAL TO CUT CHILD POVERTY BY HALF.

5 "(a) STATEMENT OF POLICY.—It is the policy of the
6 United States to reduce the number of children living in
7 poverty in the United States by half in 5 years.

8 "(b) SENSE OF THE CONGRESS.—It is the sense of 9 the Congress that an effort to reach the goal described 10 in subsection (a) shall include reducing the number of chil-11 dren in deep poverty as well as reducing child poverty 12 among racial or ethnic groups with disparate poverty 13 rates.

14 "SEC. 442. ESTABLISHMENT OF ANNUAL REPORTING.

15 "(a) Anchored Supplemental Poverty Meas-16 URE.—The Secretary shall enter into an agreement with the Bureau of the Census to report an anchored Supple-17 18 mental Poverty Measure for individuals who have not at-19 tained 18 years of age, annually beginning with calendar 20 year 2023. Beginning with the report for calendar year 21 2024, the report shall be based on poverty thresholds 22 which are adjusted for inflation using the Consumer Price 23 Index for all-urban consumers (as published by the Department of Labor). This subsection shall not be inter-24 25 preted to require or authorize the replacement of any ERN23A77 LT8

other calculation or measure reported by the Bureau of
 the Census.

3 "(b) TIMING OF RELEASE OF CURRENT POPULATION 4 SURVEY ANNUAL SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC SUPPLEMENT 5 MICRODATA.—The Bureau of the Census shall release the Current Population Survey Annual Social and Economic 6 7 Supplement microdata for each year as a single file con-8 taining the anchored Supplemental Poverty Measure and 9 any other poverty rates the Bureau of the Census reports. 10 The file shall be released at the same time as the Bureau of the Census report on Income, Poverty, and Health In-11 12 surance Coverage in the United States. That report, or 13 companion reports, should include poverty statistics and thresholds for the anchored Supplemental Poverty Meas-14 15 ure and any other measures the Bureau of the Census reports. 16

17 "(c) REPORTING IN RELATION TO THE TERRI-18 TORIES.—

"(1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall enter
into an agreement with the Bureau of the Census to
develop data to report an anchored Supplemental
Poverty Measure for Puerto Rico, Guam, the United
States Virgin Islands, the Northern Mariana Islands, and American Samoa, as part of the annual

report required by subsection (a), not later than the
 close of fiscal year 2025.

3 "(2) Report Required if compliance is not 4 FEASIBLE.—If the Secretary determines that it will 5 not be feasible to comply with all or part of para-6 graph (1), the Secretary shall submit to the Con-7 gress, not later than 6 months after the date of the 8 enactment of this section, a report that explains 9 what is not feasible, why it is not feasible, and in-10 cludes details on what, if anything, would be needed 11 to enable such compliance and by what date compli-12 ance could be achieved.

"(3) LIMITATIONS ON AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—To carry out this subsection, there
are authorized to be appropriated to the Secretary
a total of not more than \$2,000,000 for fiscal years
2024 through 2026.

18 "(d) IMPROVING INCOME DATA FOR USE IN ANNUAL19 REPORTING.—

20 "(1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall enter
21 into an agreement with the Bureau of the Census to
22 develop income data with corrections for under-re23 porting of income data for calculating an anchored
24 Supplemental Poverty Measure as part of the annual

report required by subsection (a), not later than the
 close of fiscal year 2025.

"(2) Report Required if compliance is not 3 4 FEASIBLE.—If the Secretary determines that it will 5 not be feasible to comply with all or part of para-6 graph (1), the Secretary shall submit to the Con-7 gress, not later than 6 months after the date of the 8 enactment of this section, a report that explains 9 what is not feasible, why it is not feasible, and in-10 cludes details on what, if anything, would be needed 11 to enable such compliance and by what date compli-12 ance could be achieved.

13 "SEC. 443. CHILD POVERTY REPORTS.

14 "(a) ANNUAL REPORTS ON THE EFFECT OF FED-15 ERAL POLICIES ON CHILD POVERTY IN THE UNITED STATES.—Within 6 months after the date of the enact-16 17 ment of this section, the Secretary shall enter into an 18 agreement with the National Academy of Sciences to sub-19 mit to the Congress annual reports providing an evidence-20 based, non-partisan analysis of how Federal policies or 21 programs have contributed to meeting the goal set forth 22 in section 441(a), based on their effect on the anchored 23 Supplemental Poverty Measure for children as reported by 24 the Bureau of the Census pursuant to section 442.

25 "(b) CONTENTS OF REPORTS.—

1	"(1) IN GENERAL.—Each such report—
2	"(A) shall analyze how, and the extent to
3	which, Federal policies and programs contribute
4	to meeting the goal referred to in subsection (a)
5	of this section;
6	"(B) shall take into account the number of
7	children in deep poverty and child poverty
8	among racial or ethnic groups with disparate
9	poverty rates;
10	"(C) shall attempt to ascertain whether
11	each studied policy or program reduces or in-
12	creases the number of children living in poverty,
13	why the policy or program does so, and the ex-
14	tent to which the policy or program does so;
15	and
16	"(D) shall include, to the extent feasible,
17	projections on how such policies or programs
18	would affect the number of children living in
19	poverty in future years, which shall be made on
20	the basis of previously released Current Popu-
21	lation Survey Annual Social and Economic Sup-
22	plement data, and adjusted periodically as new
23	estimates from the Bureau of the Census be-
24	come available.

(2)1 Data CORRECTIONS.—Where feasible. 2 each such report shall correct the underlying Cur-3 rent Population Survey Annual Social and Economic 4 Supplement data, for under-reporting of income and 5 in-kind benefits and shall include estimates using 6 both uncorrected and corrected income data. Be-7 cause available information with which to produce 8 corrected income data is currently limited and not 9 timely, each such report shall indicate the year to 10 which the corrected income data pertain and other 11 limitations of the data. As soon as corrected income 12 data from the Census Bureau become available 13 under section 442(d), each such report shall use 14 those data.

"(c) FEASIBILITY REVIEW OF STATE AND LOCAL 15 EVIDENCE-BASED POLICIES.—The 1st report under sub-16 17 section (a) shall include a review of the feasibility of in-18 cluding consideration of State and local evidence-based 19 policies or programs in subsequent such reports, and if 20 the review determines that including the consideration is 21 feasible, then each such report shall include an analysis 22 of the additional policies.

23 "(d) TIMING.—Each report for a year under sub24 section (a) shall be made after the report of the United
25 States Census Bureau on Income, Poverty, and Health In-

surance Coverage in the United States for the year is re-1 2 leased, and— 3 "(1) in the case of the 1st such report, before 4 the beginning of the 1st calendar year that begins 5 more than 6 months after the date of the enactment 6 of this section; or 7 "(2) in the case of each subsequent such report, 8 before the end of the year. 9 "(e) LIMITATIONS ON AUTHORIZATION OF APPRO-10 PRIATIONS.—To carry out this section, there are authorized to be appropriated not more than— 11 12 ((1) \$1,200,000 for fiscal year 2024; and13 "(2) \$1,000,000 for each of fiscal years 2025 14 through 2033. 15 "SEC. 444. CHILD POVERTY REDUCTION STRATEGY CLEAR-16 **INGHOUSE.** "The Secretary shall establish, and annually update, 17 18 on a website of the Department of Health and Human 19 Services, an online collection of resources related to the 20 national child poverty reduction goal established in section 21 441 of this Act, including— 22 "(1) the anchored Supplemental Poverty Meas-23 ure published under section 442 of this Act; 24 "(2) the reports required by section 443 of this 25 Act;

1	"(3) the report required by section 3 of the
2	Child Poverty Reduction Act of 2023;
3	"(4) the report required by section 4 of the
4	Child Poverty Reduction Act of 2023; and
5	"(5) links to other relevant Federal reports,
6	analyses, evaluations, and resources related to child
7	poverty as determined by the Secretary.
8	"SEC. 445. DEFINITIONS.
9	"In this part:
10	"(1) ANCHORED.—The term 'anchored' means
11	fixed at a given point in time, and annually adjusted
12	by a measure reflecting only changes in prices.
13	"(2) POVERTY.—The term 'poverty' means,
14	with respect to an individual or family, that the indi-
15	vidual or family has a total annual income that is
16	less than the anchored Supplemental Poverty thresh-

1SEC. 3. UPDATE OF "A ROADMAP TO REDUCE CHILD POV-2ERTY".

3 (a) IN GENERAL.—Within 12 months after the date
4 of the enactment of this section, the Secretary of Health
5 and Human Services shall enter into an agreement with
6 the National Academy of Sciences to revise and update
7 the National Academies report entitled "A Roadmap to
8 Reduce Child Poverty" within 24 months after the date
9 of entry into the agreement.

(b) LIMITATIONS ON AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—To carry out subsection (a), there are authorized to be appropriated not more than \$2,200,000.

13 SEC. 4. REPORT ON REDUCING LONG-TERM, INTERGENERA 14 TIONAL CHILD POVERTY.

15 (a) IN GENERAL.—Within 6 months after the date 16 of the enactment of this section, the Secretary of Health 17 and Human Services shall enter into an agreement with 18 the National Academy of Sciences to publish, within 36 19 months after the date of entry into the agreement, a re-20 port on evidence-based policies to reduce long-term, intergenerational child poverty, which report shall build on the 21 National Academies report entitled "A Roadmap to Re-22 23 duce Child Poverty".

(b) LIMITATIONS ON AUTHORIZATION OF APPRO25 PRIATIONS.—To carry out subsection (a), there are au26 thorized to be appropriated not more than \$2,200,000.
